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IUPPITER DOLICHENUS: a shrine in Region XIV, known only from two inscriptions (CIL vi. 415, 418).

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IUPPITER IURARIUS: apparently a shrine, known only from a dedicatory inscription made of white stones in a pavement of opus signinum that was found in 1854 under the cloister of S. Giovanni Calibita in the northern part of the island in the Tiber (CIL i^2 . 990= vi. 379; C. Volcaci(us) C. f. har(uspex) de stipe Iovi iurario . . . onimentom; cf. v. Suppl. ital. 1272; ILS 3037). Iuppiter iurarius seems to be a translation of Zeΰς πίστιος or όρκιος, but whether this was an independent shrine or to be identified with that of some other deity, e.g. SEMO SANCUS (q.v.), is uncertain (HJ 636; Rosch. ii. 678; iv. 319; WR 131; Besnier, 255-271).
